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

he late **Elder Joseph Yaw** Nsiah Yeboah was born on Offinso-Boase in the Ashanti Region of Ghana. He and **Madam Akua Pomaah**, both S. A. K. Kakari for two years. of blessed memory.

From the very beginning, his life was characterized by humility and resilience -virtues that would go on to define his remarkable journey.

Journey of Education

Though Elder Nsiah's early years were without the privilege of formal education, his thirst for knowledge and personal growth was evident from the beginning.

Under the loving guidance of his elder sister. Mame Ama Achiaa, he apprenticed as a carpenter, nurturing both skill and discipline.

In 1962, his life took a divine turn when he was adopted by the late Prophet M. K. Yeboah, then Chairman of The Church of Pentecost.

Two years later, in 1964, he relocated to Kumasi, where he learned the craft of preparing and packaging coffee for sale. During this period, he also seized the opportunity to pursue formal education at St. Peter's Evening School.

In Accra, Elder Nsiah embarked on a journey marked by hard work, versatility, and enterprise. In the early 1970s, he began trading in metals at the Timber Market, marking the start of his active engagement in commerce.

His dedication and integrity soon earned him opportunities to serve as a marketer for reputable companies such as GB Olivant Ghana Ltd., Major & Co., J. Morrison, Seward, and Fiazal Ghana Ltd., where he supplied pharmaceutical products to retail stores.

Elder Nsiah's entrepreneurial spirit found further expression when, after relocating to Kasoa in 1974, he embraced vegetable farming, a venture he faithfully pursued until 2003.

Ever resilient and determined, he later shifted into the building industry, working with molded blocks, before eventually dedicating himself to the sale of water—a humble vet impactful venture he sustained diligently until his peaceful departure.

bout forty-seven years ago, Elder J. Y. Nsiah (Rtd) became our father, and from that day until death laid its icy hands on him, he perfectly fulfilled the role of fatherhood.

He led an exemplary life throughout his days, becoming our first teacher, counselor, and mentor.

We, his children, knew him to be truthful and faithful in all his dealings—whether at home, in church, or anywhere else. He always chose to tell the truth, even at the risk of his own safety, rather than lie to protect himself.

From the earliest stages of our childhood, he led family devotions and taught us the Scriptures whenever we gathered. His uncompromising nature meant no one dared remain in bed or arrive late for devotion.

As an excellent teacher of God's Word, he explained the Scriptures so clearly that even the youngest among us could understand. He instilled in us the habit of reading and meditating on the Bible, making it a vital part of our lives.

Our father was willing to give his very last breath for the things of

God. As children, we never understood why he abandoned three of his shops at Timber Market in Accra to relocate to Kasoa—until we discovered that his desire was to lead a new convert to Christ and dedicate more time to God's work.

Ironically, our family was not in a strong financial position at that time, but this decision turned out to be a blessing in disguise. Ever since, we have thanked God for that singular act of faith.

Though he was not a wealthy man, he made our well-being his top priority. Education was his number one concern—not only for his own children, but also for those who lived with him.

He ensured that everyone received some form of education, whether formal or informal. To achieve this, he even sold some of his properties to invest in our future.

As a father of all daughters, he strongly believed—and repeatedly reminded us—that whatever men can do, women can do equally well, if not better.

One of his sayings that has stayed with us from childhood is: "When male and female children are born on the same day, neither

comes holding gold in their hands." This was his way of teaching us that with trust in God, effort, and preparation, we could achieve anything in life.

He was our number one encourager and counselor. Whenever we faced challenges, he was our go-to person.

One of his favorite sayings to lift our spirits was in Akan: "Se Yehowa te ase na me kra te ase"—meaning, "As long as Jehovah lives, and as long as I have life, nothing life throws at us should trouble us—we will overcome and emerge victorious."

His fervent prayers and blessings truly worked for us in all that we did. We have lost a fatherly shield that no one can replace.

Egya Nsiah, who will we run to for advice? Who will we call "Father" when we return home? We will forever cherish the stories, lessons, and songs you created for us. We remember your extraordinary care—how you would continuously call us whenever we stepped out until we finally returned home safely.

Your acts of kindness and generosity, without discrimination, still echo in our

hearts. You made sure that everyone under your care was provided for.

You were our best friend, brother, pastor, and prophet. As we mourn, our hearts are broken in ways that may never fully heal. Yet your legacy will remain a constant reminder and guide throughout our lives.

There is no better way to honor your memory than to become better versions of ourselves, just as you always encouraged us to be.

We vow to uphold the peaceful life you led. On June 12th this year—your birthday—your daughter Pomaah called to wish you well, but you could not respond due to illness.

Just days later, you peacefully departed to meet your Maker.

We prayed for more time with you, but we know God's will is perfect. We take comfort in the resurrection hope we have in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, knowing that we will meet again in glory.

oday, we gather with hearts full of gratitude and admiration to honour a life well-lived in the service of the Lord and The Church of Pentecost.

Elder Joseph Yaw Nsiah was more than just a member of The Church of Pentecost—he was a pillar, a mentor, and an enduring example of unwavering faith.

His journey with the Lord began in 1962 when he was converted and baptised during a General Convention held at Asante Mampong.

From that moment, his life was marked by tireless devotion to God's work and sacrificial service to The Church of Pentecost.

In 1965, he humbly assumed the role of Chapel Leader at the Bantama Central Chapel—now the Kumasi Central District—leading with vision and steadfast faith.

His commitment was further recognised in 1967 when he was ordained as a Deacon in Kumasi.

He went on to serve faithfully as a Witness Leader, inspiring many through his steadfast example and love for God's work.

The year 1970 marked a new chapter in Elder Nsiah's ministry. Following the transfer of the late Prophet M. K. Yeboah to Accra, Elder Nsiah also relocated from Kumasi to the nation's capital.

Then, in 1972, a mighty wave of evangelism swept into Kasoa under the leadership of the late Pastor Thomas Nyarko and the late Elder Simpson of Bubuashei No. 1, under the Kaneshie District.

The Lord greatly blessed this mission—22 souls were won—and the lamp of The Church of Pentecost was lit in Kasoa.

Even in his service as a Deacon, Elder Nsiah was divinely chosen to shepherd this newly established assembly worshipping under an orange tree in Mr Amoah's house.

The early pioneers of this young congregation included Mr. Amoah's household, the Zutas, Aunty Amerley's household, and Sister Araba, soon joined by the late Aya's household.

Answering the call with faith and humility, Elder Nsiah relocated to Kasoa in November 1972, as a healthy young man and very energetic planting his life firmly in the soil of God's work—a ministry that would bear fruit for

generations, this made him resigned from his work.

Elder Nsiah due to the activities of the church developed a lot of sickness, went through hardship and eventually going blind till his demies.

In those formative years, he served diligently as Presiding Deacon, guiding the flock with wisdom and grace.

In 1977, under the ministry of the late Apostle Paintsil, he was ordained into the noble office of Elder in The Church of Pentecost—a sacred calling that ushered him into deeper service in the Lord's vineyard.

His helps to the Church are truly out of measure. With unwavering dedication and God-given vision, Elder Joseph Yaw Nsiah Yeboah spearheaded several landmark projects that greatly advanced the growth of The Church of Pentecost in Kasoa.

Among these were the acquisition of the KCC land, the construction of the Kasoa

District Mission House, and his involvement in the commencement of the Pentecost Preparatory School, a vision initiated by Elder E. O. Darko.

He was also instrumental in securing various lands and properties in Kasoa and Downtown Ofaakor—most notably the Upper Room Assembly, now known as King's Town.

Beyond structural development, Elder Nsiah played a pivotal role in building bridges of peace and understanding.

He established strong ties with the Muslim leadership in Kasoa by generously presenting them with calendars and diaries every year, fostering unity and mutual respect between the Church and the wider community.

Elder Nsiah's leadership journey included serving as Presiding Elderin:

- KCC (1972-1981)
- Ofaakor Assembly (now Ofaakor Central)


- in the Downtown Ofaakor Area (1994–1997)
- Bethel Assembly, Adakope (1997–1999)
- Upper Room (now King's Town) in the Downtown Ofaakor Area (2002–2006) He later served faithfully as a supporting Elder in KCC 2 from 2006 until the day the Lord called him home.


Today, as we celebrate a life devoted to Christ, we also give thanks to God for the precious gift of Elder Joseph Yaw Nsiah.
